### **1.2 Our Aim.**

To combat rural isolation and loneliness throughout Suffolk by visiting rural locations and holding events that act as a catalyst for people to talk with one another in a friendly and non-threatening atmosphere and provide access to services to individuals and communities



### **1.3 Structure of the Annual Review Document**

The Annual Review this year basically follows last year's format, but is scaled-down a little which (reflecting comments made within it) is a result of our need to devote increased time to fundraising in the present day challenging environment whilst maintaining our determination to focus our resources on delivery of our main aims. Irrespective of this, the Review sets-out to give a comprehensive and informative view of the year and contains broad overviews coupled with detailed statistics to allow the reader to appreciate and evaluate our work in 2015.

In the "Introduction" section we have again included a foreword from Sally. At Section 2.1 we have provided an "at a glance" view of the year providing a quick and easy reference to the year's high level statistics. There is much more information in Section 2.2 the "in depth" section, where there is a greater breadth and depth to our activities which, hopefully, provides a real feel for what we achieved in 2015.

Section 2.3 starts with a comment from our patron Stephen Miles, and then gives a few details about the people who have been directly involved in our delivery throughout the year. In Section 2.4 we list the Local Authorities and organisations we have worked with during the period. It provides an insight into the diverse nature of the organisations we have contact with and, perhaps, highlights how much work has gone into continuing to engage with such a large number in 2015.

Section 2.5 "The year ahead" is a short summary of how we will move on from 2015 and provides a quick look at what will, and what will not, change as we go through a new year.

The final element to Section 2 is an outtake from the comments and emails we have received from various places that remind us that we are very "real" to a great many people and our work is both necessary and appreciated.

This year we have reverted to including the independently audited accounts in the Review document. These are at Section 3 and Section 4 "Appendices" contains the years statistics.

## 2. Annual Review

### 2.1 2015 At a Glance

We welcomed 5748 visitors

We made 194 visits

We visited 79 villages in 7 Local Authority districts

...and we worked with 66 Organisations

We exchanged 250 pairs of slippers and replaced 294 ferrules

We held 6 “mini” events and 3 Golden Age Fairs

We welcomed around 200 visitors at the Suffolk Show and over 100 at Euston Rural Pastimes

We fundraised for, prepared and organised 2 Loneliness Awareness Workshops for early 2016

We maintained contact with Big Lunch Extras; organised an Outreach Camp in Ipswich and presented on fundraising at one of their workshops

We won an award from National Energy Action to purchase two Air Printers for use in remote locations

We attracted 2500 followers on Twitter

We worked with all the Local Authorities across the County

During the year we had over 105 volunteers active in delivering our service, volunteering a total of 1527 hours

## 2.2 2015 in Depth

In 2015 we continued to focus on the need we are addressing. In rural areas 25% of households are in income poverty and rural wages are 9% lower than urban wages. Many rural jobs are part time, seasonal or insecure and many workers combine 2 or 3 part time jobs and consequently struggle to balance work and life. Village shops, post offices and pubs have disappeared and often populations have changed leading to less opportunity for people to meet or have social contact. The elderly, in particular, are often left isolated as children move away.

*“In recent years, solving the problem of loneliness and social isolation among older people has become a national priority. Studies have consistently found that 5-16% of people aged 65 or over feel lonely all or most of the time”.*

Businesses and Agencies struggle to provide services to rural areas, and it is often these very services that improve villagers’ wellbeing or make a real difference to their quality of life. Access to information that could help has become patchy, poor or non-existent adding to feelings of isolation and loneliness. We aim to directly address this need in Suffolk through our village visits.

So the year was spent making efforts to build on the progress of previous years both in the delivery of our objectives in the villages and in raising funds to ensure our sustainability. We also maintained our objective of continuing to forge strong links with Local Authorities, Organisations and Social Enterprises. We continued to successfully raise our profile throughout the year and remain in demand both by villages (measured by the number of invitations we receive) and by Organisations and Social Enterprises (where feedback tells us we are valued as an effective delivery channel for their services). During the year we also saw substantially increased engagement with Local Authorities (especially Suffolk County Council) who were open to our views and comments as they developed existing services and formulated new policies on rural isolation and inclusivity.

During the year we said “goodbye” to our caravan, a vehicle that had served us well over the years, but was now tired and in need of rest.....and “hello” to a replacement which we obtained with generous donations from Mid Suffolk, Babergh and Coastal District Councils. The “new” asset was liveried and set to work immediately, providing an enhanced capability to our work, and our image.

We worked hard to ensure our infrastructure remained robust enough to support our delivery priorities by holding regular and challenging Committee meetings; maintaining efficient accounting processes and continuing our enthusiasm for social media (2500 followers on Twitter) to increase our profile and promote our work. We ensured we maintained our discipline for collection of statistics and organised ourselves to allow time for effective networking.

We remain extremely active in all aspects of meeting our stated outcomes.

We stuck to our core aim by means of our caravan and campervan visiting identified target villages to provide a social event and practical advice to individuals, communities and businesses. We believe that conversation is the “social glue” and we provide a means of facilitating this. We encouraged greater social cohesion, especially in areas characterised by lack of transport, distance from a large centre of population, or which are geographically dispersed. Types of visitors we were able to assist included the elderly, young families, lone parents and those on low incomes.

*“Loneliness and social isolation are harmful to our health. Research shows that lacking social connections is as damaging to our health as smoking 15 cigarettes a day”*: Holt – Lunstad 2010

Taking our service to rural locations throughout the year has provided them with access to a wide range of information, answered questions and helped with research on the spot. Equally importantly, we have offered organisations the chance to come with us and talk directly to rural residents. This type of visit is called an ‘Information Drop’. This means we extend an open invitation to organisations finding it difficult to get to talk to ‘hard to reach’ folk to furnish us with leaflets,

have a stand at our events, a link on our website and if possible travel with us. We have done this throughout 2015.

Other organisations in 2015 who have asked us to help them promote initiatives include Waveney District Council, Healthwatch, East of England Co-op Community Initiative, The CAB, “The Big Lunch”, Suffolk Switched-On and Orbit Housing. Delivery of our core work throughout the year was firmly focussed on loneliness and social isolation in rural Suffolk, to address a need which is seemingly more and more recognised:

*“An increasing number of older people are living alone and are at risk of being socially isolated in the UK. This is of concern because social isolation has been identified as a risk factor for poor health and reduced wellbeing, including mortality, depression and cognitive decline. Because older people who are isolated have smaller networks of relatives, neighbours and friends, they have less support to draw on to help meet their social, social care or other needs. They may not have access to appropriate formal health or social care services, which in turn could have deleterious longer-term consequences for their health and wellbeing”*

Extract: “Health and wellbeing consequences of social isolation and loneliness in old age”: NHS National Institute for Health Research and LSE study March 2014

We continued to provide slippers and ferrules at all visits and events and this is now an integral part of our work. We exchanged 250 pairs of slippers and 294 ferrules during the year in an effort to prevent slips, trips and broken hips!

Fundraising during the year became a higher priority as it became apparent that there was ever increasing competition for this declining resource. However, we were successful in winning a grant from Esmée Fairbairn for £30,000 over two years which has been invaluable. This grant alone allowed us to address issues of sustainability, fund the delivery of village visits and events, ensured we provided appropriate access to information to remote locations and, in essence, underpinned both our core work and the need for extra focus on fundraising.

We initiated a slight change in Ann's role to increase capacity to address fundraising and increased Michael's hours to work on a sustainable infrastructure for the future. We increased the profile of future funds with trustees and committee members with a one day workshop focussed on the issue.

We held three Golden Age Fairs (GAFs) in the year, the first of which was at Brandon followed by Woodbridge and Thurston. We continue to attract significant numbers of organisations to attend our GAFs and they continue to be very popular and well attended. We had 374 visitors to GAFs in 2015.

Golden Age Fairs are large undertakings that require considerable planning and 'on the day' organisation. Their success is down, in no small part, to pre-event intensive marketing combined with the good humour, enthusiasm and hard work of our volunteers that help us deliver the event. A continuing feature of these and in fact, ALL our events is that we take great care of every one of our guests whether they are stand holders or members of the public. Feedback from organisations and visitors attending Golden Age Fairs remains consistently extremely positive demonstrating that we meet the expectations of all concerned. They have become and will remain an important part of our work.

In 2015 we continued our efforts to attract and engage with more people in as many ways as possible. We held four Memory Lane Cream Teas, were represented in two stands at the Suffolk Show, took part in the Trading Standards Conference, engaged with the Co-op Community Cuppa Event at Wherstead. Response to our active involvement in wider but associated activities has been welcomed and has increased our reputation with partners. It is possible that our policy of focussing on delivery of our core objectives in a time of increased resources needed to fundraise may affect our ability to maintain these activities next year.

The Memory Lane Cream Teas were a great success. The idea came from conversations with visitors who felt that there were others in their communities who would really benefit from social contact but who, for some reason, had not come to

our visits. At the Orford event we met someone who told us that they had not had a conversation with anyone for two months. We continue to borrow memory boxes from the Museum of East Anglian Life, choosing “Royalty”, “Work”, “Wartime” and “Childhood” themed boxes. The contents were fascinating, sparking memories and often producing laughter as our guests examined the objects. In 2015 we started an initiative to create our own boxes.

We continue to use Garry’s amazing homemade “jukebox”\_to play music from the 30s and 40s and used our projector to screen old film footage

During the year two Redlingfield residents, regular visitors to the caravan, asked if they could celebrate their Golden Wedding on our visit. The village has no suitable venue and it meant that we could provide a means of allowing them to share the occasion with their local community. We enthusiastically agreed. Sally conducted the blessing and the whole event was broadcast live on Radio Suffolk. It was a beautiful day in every respect, with lots of people attending, and a privilege for The Coffee Caravan to host it.

In 2015 we saw a significant increase in our number of visitors. Some of this increase will be a direct consequence of the Cream Teas and other “mini” events with people inspired to be more involved with us and then remain engaged with their community to a greater extent. Certainly numbers to our traditional visits have increased. In fact providing these “mini” events we engaged and helped over 418 people as well as making more people aware of our core work in their villages. Smaller events definitely have a place in the work we do.

In the year we had an active presence at major local events. At the 2015 Suffolk Show our stand was visited by around 200 people and we welcomed over 100 people at the Euston Rural Pastimes event shortly after in June.

Once again we were invited by our Patron Stephen Miles to attend the “Trash and Treasure” event held at his farm Limes Farm, Great Ashfield. We sold refreshments to the customers as a fundraiser and raised over £750.

These events are a great way for us to raise our profile and spread awareness of what we do and why we do it. Our objective in being part of these major events is to cement our place as an effective LOCAL charity acting for local people and doing good work in their community.

As we suspected 2015 saw Big Lunch Extras combine with The Big Lunch initiative to become one organisation and throughout the year we maintained the links we forged in the previous year. We proposed the village green at Benhall Green as a suitable venue for The Big Lunch to hold a regional event. We were involved in the planning of the BBQ and entertainment and 150 people attended. Ann and Garry were invited to present a funding workshop at an outreach event for Big Lunch members in Milton Keynes which was attended by over 100 people. It was an opportunity for us to share experiences and expertise with the audience and provided a chance to showcase our work. We have much in common with The Big Lunch initiative and we will continue with this policy of close engagement in 2016.

In 2015 we accepted an invitation from Essex County Council to present our work at an event organised by their Strengthening Communities Dept. Our reputation is spreading!

During the year Garry became a Suffolk “Switched-on” volunteer, a qualification following training from Suffolk Befriending. It means he can legitimately advise people on energy use, home improvements to increase energy efficiency and money saving initiatives. He also advised on, and helped open the Men’s Shed in Ipswich. If that was not enough he also completed the Activlives New-Age Curling Training Course which allows him to demonstrate this activity to visitors at events. We shall be seeking funding for this equipment which provides a fun, accessible activity for



any age and ability....and will allow Garry to demonstrate his new found prowess to our visitors and encourage them to be involved in the exercise it provides.

We worked with Trading Standards to develop and produce a folder containing extensive examples of scams that people are exposed to in everyday life. These folders are carried on both of our vehicles, and visitors are encouraged to read them in order for them to recognise a scam and avoid costly mistakes.

In 2015 we continued to take every opportunity to attend networking events and to meet with agencies to keep up to date on initiatives in Suffolk and also to enable them to understand our work and objectives. We will work with others where there is a common theme and where by linking-up we deliver more effective benefit to the people we want to help.

The overriding lesson of the last twelve years, reinforced again in 2015, is the need to talk, to have *conversations*. So much comes out of this basic human need, ideas, offers of help, requests *for* help, information, seeds of friendship. We continue to find that all these things begin with people just chatting to each other. Unwelcome solitude can destroy confidence and even exacerbate existing conditions. Outcomes for a charity like ours can be hard to quantify but we continue to receive feedback that we have made a difference to an individual by offering them a cuppa and a chat. For some the chance to chat is simply not an everyday occurrence.

Our work in 2015 took us to 79 villages across Suffolk, engaging directly with 5,748 residents in their own neighbourhoods, making a positive difference to people and providing an opportunity for them to simply chat and to meet others in their community, if that was what they wanted, or to seek help if it was needed.

We know now from all the experience we have gained over the years, people feel safer when they have an easy familiarity with fellow members of their neighbourhood and that they feel more inclined to engage in community activity if they have the confidence that comes with that feeling of safety. The friendly, easy

going atmosphere at one of our visits can be a great start to becoming a more active member of the community. In 2015 we made 196 visits across Suffolk to make this happen.

Special thanks this year go to Karen Finch owner of Ipswich based business “The Hearing Care Centre” who attend our events offering hearing tests. They chose us a beneficiary of their Quiz at Seckford Hall. We gratefully accepted this generous offer which resulted in a donation of £920 which we put towards the forthcoming purchase of a replacement campervan.

.....and also special thanks to Freddie Gaythorne-Hardy and Jason Runnquist of Christies Care for the gift of our brand new website. Planning commenced in 2015 for the new site which will provide us with increased functionality, be user friendly and will enhance our reputation with all users including funding organisations. It is expected to come on-line in early 2016.

.....and also special thanks to the Suffolk Constabulary Male Voice Choir for their offer to prepare and produce a fundraising event for us to be held in early 2016

Volunteers have always been the life-blood of our organisation. We are incredibly fortunate to have such dedicated, willing and exceedingly good-humoured volunteers....and they all continued their really hard work in 2015. They are a diverse bunch with diverse skills....towing, baking, insurance, accounting, health and safety, marketing and tea making are just a few!

Quotes from Rural Coffee Caravan volunteers:

*“Why do I volunteer? I’ve seen the gratitude on people’s faces when they’ve received advice on something that’s been worrying them – even just sharing a problem is seen as helping. I’ve heard the laughter when villagers had gathered together and shared experiences. And I’ve smelt the coffee”.*

*“Having moved to a village in Suffolk and getting involved in the establishment of a community shop and developing a children’s play-ground, it became*

*obvious that we needed a lot of advice. The committees approached The Coffee Caravan, and the guidance we were given helped both projects to a very successful conclusion. Seeing the need for The Coffee Caravan in isolated communities, I thought the least I could do was volunteer some of my time”*

*“The Rural Coffee Caravan performs a vital role with its community development approach in getting information to people in rural areas who often fall beyond the reach of established town-based agencies. I don’t have the knowledge or skills to be a social advisor for individuals, but I can help those who do to get the message out to people who need to know. We can all find ways to multiply our individual talents by working as a part of a team, and this works for me”*

In 2015 we had 105 volunteers bringing their skills as well as igniting conversations with, and actively listening to, our visitors and signposting when appropriate.

## **2.5 The Year Ahead**

In summary, in 2016 our objective will be to continue to deliver a service to communities throughout Suffolk that tackles rural isolation and loneliness and promotes community spirit. We will continue to be a catalyst for community development and keep fostering community spirit by being a point of contact for many villagers. We will continue to create an environment in which visitors and support organisations feel a sense of trust, safety and neutrality; and provide a balanced mix of services and events to meet the needs of different communities.

We will continue to support 'hard to reach' groups.

However, it is certain that the fundraising environment on which we are financially reliant will become even more challenging next year. The increased competition for limited funds, and the resultant increase in the resources needed to be dedicated to successful fundraising, which were already evident in 2015 will not ease next year. The declining situation will demand that we remain focussed and determined about our fundraising activities whilst still delivering our service to the rural community. This will be a challenge for us that looks set to continue throughout next year.

We will continue our work with other organisations, positioning ourselves as a vital part of the voluntary and "not for profit sector" infrastructure in Suffolk, and we will continue to help Local Authorities and Organisations to serve and to deliver their work to people in rural communities

We will build on what worked well in 2015 and proceeding years, as well as ensuring we work to ensure the sustainability of the charity.

Specifically, we will:

- Ensure we concentrate on village visits
- Explore all fundraising opportunities to find alternative sources of funding to cover core costs
- Maintain relationships with local authorities and organisations and encourage representatives from local councils and voluntary organisations to accompany us on visits and take part in our events
- Continue to be an enabler for Local Authorities to deliver more effective services to their customers. We will work with them and be seen as an effective outsourced and respected service provider
- Deliver 2 Golden Age Fairs gradually increasing the attendance and 'reach' of the GAF programme
- Deliver at least 10 Mini Events (an increase of 4)
- Raise the charity's profile, continuing our work with "The Big Lunch" and "The Campaign to End Loneliness" organisations
- Ensure we take every opportunity to increase our pool of volunteers
- Review the effectiveness and usability of data collected and implement any new, more appropriate statistical analysis required
- We will review and update policies in line with our schedule
- Continue to use the services of a professional fundraiser
- Ensure that throughout the year we work within budget and cash flow requirements at all times.
